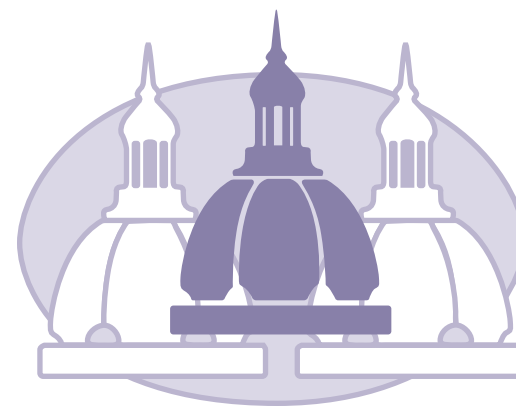

DESCRIPTION

The portrait collections of The Johns Hopkins Hospital, The Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine, The Johns Hopkins University School of Nursing and The Johns Hopkins University Bloomberg School of Public Health grow annually as departments, the schools and the University follow the longstanding tradition of portraiture to honor distinguished faculty, deans, trustees, directors and others who have played a significant role at the institutions. The collection consists largely of works in oil, most of which are on display throughout the East Baltimore Campus. A wide range of nineteenth and twentieth century artists are represented, including: John Singer Sargent, Cecilia Beaux, William Merritt Chase, Thomas Corner, Cedric Egeli, Peter Egeli, Herbert Abrams, William Draper and Raoul Middleman.

The Alan Mason Chesney Medical Archives documents the history of the Medical Institutions and the lives of its faculty, staff and alumni. Evergreen House, an impressive Italianate building with classical revival additions, was built in 1857 by the Broadbent family. It was purchased in 1878 by John W. Garrett, president of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, for his son, T. Harrison Garrett. Throughout the 1880s, T. Harrison and his wife, Alice Whitridge Garrett, carried out an ambitious program of renovation and construction on the estate. Their eldest son, John Work Garrett, inherited the house in 1920 and continued with his wife, Alice Warder Garrett, the family tradition of modifying and expanding Evergreen. Upon his death in 1942, Mr. Garrett bequeathed the estate to The Johns Hopkins University, with the stipulation that the mansion remain open to "lovers of music, art and beautiful things." Today, Evergreen showcases the more than 50,000 extraordinary and eclectic objects assembled by two generations of the Garrett family. An exhibit featuring artwork of the four 2009 graduates of the Department of Art as Applied to Medicine will be on display during the Biennial Meeting. This department was established by pioneering medical illustrator, Max Brödel, a colleague of Tom Cullen, Howard Kelly, Harvey Cushing and William Halsted. Brödel's clear, beautiful and anatomically accurate images helped disseminate the innovative and creative work of the early Hopkins researchers and clinicians who established excellence as the enduring culture of this institution.

Endowed in 1911 under Max Brödel, the Department continued to flourish under the directorship of Ranice W. Crosby for 40 years, from 1943 -1983. Under her stewardship, the University awarded the first M.A. degree in Medical and Biological Illustration in 1961.

The curriculum continues to evolve to reflect changes in medicine and the impact of digital media for artists. It maintains an excellent balance between traditional and new media. Subject matter includes anatomical, surgical, ophthalmological, cellular, molecular, botanical and zoological topics. The program continues its original emphasis on the accuracy, clarity, aesthetic appeal and teaching impact of the images. It is currently one of only four accredited graduate programs in medical illustration in this country.

The four 2009 graduates of the Master of Arts program are Julia Molnar, Inna-Marie Strazhnik, Jared Travnicek, and Jenny Wang. They have over 80 images on display depicting a wide variety of subject matter, including illustrations from their thesis topics. The images were created in various media: pen and ink, graphite, watercolor, colored pencil, and digital software for drawing and painting, animating and 3D modeling.
